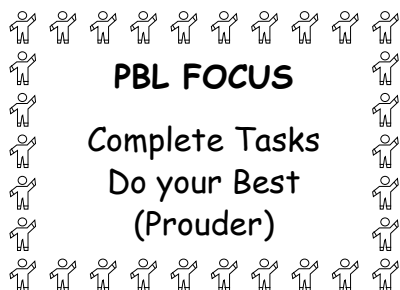

Principals Report

Welcome back to another busy term at Condobolin High School. Over the holiday break Miss Norton and I travelled to China with nine Condobolin students and two students from Lake Cargelligo and what an amazing trip we had. From Shanghai to Xian then Beijing, we visited temples, museums, palaces, parks, shopping districts, tombs as well as iconic sites such as the Terracotta Warriors, Tiananmen Square, Forbidden City and the Great Wall of China. It was a wonderful trip and the students were fantastic; a big thank you to Miss Norton for her efforts in putting the trip together and the students who were great travelling companions. I hope the trip was something you will take away and remember forever, the sites, the masses of people and of course the great Chinese food. The adventure opened our eyes to how big the world is, to appreciate other cultures and people and to appreciate coming home to what a lot of the students missed 'mums cooking'.



Whilst I was away I was getting constant updates on the flooding in Condobolin. I must say being so far away and seeing pictures of the water from the Lachlan River creeping up over the school oval and hearing that our school was being used as an evacuation site was quite troubling. As it turned out our school was safe and the flood waters did not rise enough to cause damage to the school. However it did have a significant effect on our staff and students. I can't thank some staff enough for the efforts they made in getting to work, living in town with family and friends and making round trips to get here taking up to three hours to get into town, via boat, tractor or four wheel drive. We have had staff from other schools with us and students doing shared

enrolments with other schools. On Friday 14th October the High School hosted a BBQ for all the Defence personnel, SES, Rural Fire Service, Council and volunteers who worked night and day protecting the town. It was a great way for the community to thank these people for everything they did. Can I make special mention of Jamie Ross, Bradon Perry and Cody Perry for giving up their time to sandbag with the SES. Their efforts have been recognised well done.

Year 12 students commenced their Higher School Certificate (HSC) examinations on Thursday 13th October and we wish them all the best. I have spoken to a number of the students who are confident they have done their best and are looking forward to finishing and starting the next chapter of their lives. On Year 12, can I sum up what was a whirlwind end to term 3, with graduations both LAP and our school graduation dinner, the end of school assembly and final year 12 disco. Show Team has finished off the show season for 2016 with the Upper Hunter Beef Bonanza held at Scone from the 20th to 22nd of October. Seven students travelled up on Thursday to exhibit steers and heifers that they have prepared over recent months.

Leading the way were our two steers Burnout Boy and Cruiser who have gone on to become the food of tomorrow. Burnout Boy did exceptionally well earning a third place ribbon in his school steer challenge class on Friday and another third place ribbon in the open section on the Saturday. Cruiser was well behaved throughout the weekend but didn't receive any ribbons. The heifers were presented and judged on the Saturday afternoon but were unsuccessful on the day.

The highlight of the show was the parading section held Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning. Despite rain coming in steady all day the students managed to get their animals prepared and themselves presentable. McKayla and Hayley come up against a very tough judge in their classes and didn't make it through to the finals. However I was impressed with both girls ring etiquette and abilities. Hamish, Felicity and Zane competed in a separate age group and were up against some tough competition. Both Hamish and Felicity placed in the top two in their finals and went on to the semi-finals. A trifecta was nearly had with Zane coming under some close scrutiny by the judge before being passed over. Hamish and Felicity went on to compete for the champion parade in their age group with Hamish placing seventh. Just to indicate the size of these achievements there was a total of 880 paraders registered on the weekend with around 140-150 kids in each age group. So well done! Stage 5 Science

Stage 5 have just completed their major local ecosystem independent research project. They studied Condobolin's weather patterns, reviewed Indigenous sustainability and the way they looked after the land. Students collected and named both plant and insect species native to Condobolin. To finalise the assessment, students were asked to present their work

in the form of a display. Many students took great care in presenting their work and there were some amazing presentations. Stage 5 are currently studying the generation of electricity. We would like to thank everyone for their donations of lemons to be used as lemon batteries.



China

On 24th September 11 Students, 1 Teacher and 1 Principal boarded flight SQ212 to Singapore on route to Shanghai. Unfortunately, our flight left at 7:55am so we had to be at the airport by 5am. After kisses, hugs and many tears we were set for China.

After a stop over in Singapore, we arrived at Shanghai airport at 10:45pm. We were on the look-out for our guide "Jane". After finding Jane, we loaded our bus ready for the motel and a good night sleep. Jane informed us that she was also the guide for the 2012 (Miss Rees and Mrs Moon) China trip.

Day 2:

After breakfast we traveled to the Jade Buddha temple. There were many different Buddha's located around the temple, Jade Buddha being the most significant. After saying our prayers, we were onto the new Pu Dong economic zone. This was the first taste of the celebrity status that the students experienced. As they were walking along the water and looking at the grand view of the city, locals kept stopping the students to take their photo.

After lunch, we visited the People's Square and the Shanghai Museum. The Museum provided a collection of cultural items including; ancient Chinese bronze, ceramics, painting and calligraphy.

Dinner was followed by an Acrobatic show at the Shanghai Grand Theatre. The students were often shaking their heads in disbelief at what these performers could do.

Day 3:

Next was the day trip to Suzhou. This picturesque city is renowned for its silk and embroidery as well as its ornate gardens and canal network, hence its being referred to as the Venice of the East. We started the day visiting a typical Chinese Garden. I wish I had a garden like that. We then boarded a boat for a river cruise along the Suzhou river.

In the afternoon we visited Suzhou No. 1 Silk Factory. We are able to see the entire process of silk making. At the end of course we were able to purchase products at "extremely low prices". Everyone seemed to have purchased something. This was followed by a hike up to the top of Tiger Hill.

Day 4:

After check-out at our hotel on this morning, we visited the 400-year-old Yu Garden and the old town bazaar. With its shaded alcoves, glittering pools churning with fish, pavilions, pines sprouting wistfully from rockeries, and roving packs of Japanese tourists, the Yùyuán Gardens is one of Shànghǎi's premier sights.

In the afternoon we shopped on Nanjing Road, the main shopping road in Shanghai. Many hours were spent here, but it didn't seem like enough time for two students, who managed to arrive late as they had to try on shoes.

We later headed to the airport for our flight to Xi'an.

Day 5:

Xi'an by day is beautiful but by night..... just spectacular! Day 5 started with a visit to the Shaanxi Historical Museum. The building covers an area of over 70,000 square meters, with more than 37,000 historical relics excavated from all over Shaanxi Province. The collection includes bronzeware from the Western Zhou Dynasty, 3,000 years ago, terracotta figures, gold and silverware and murals discovered in Tang tombs.

For the remainder of the day, we visited the oldest City Wall of China which defined the city limits of Xian. The wall covers an area of 12 square kilometers. The best way to explore this was by bike. The ground was very rough in some places - not very comfortable whilst riding!

This wall by night is amazing. The Bell tower and the South and North towers have been preserved well. At night they are lit up and located in the heart of the city. The wall itself is also lit up for all 12kms.

Day 6:

On this morning, we visited The Terra-Cotta Warriors Museum which is the eighth wonder of the world. The Terra-Cotta Warriors are six thousand Terra-Cotta soldiers and horses guarding Emperor Qin's Tomb and have been buried for over two thousand years. When you walk into pit 1, you just have to pinch yourself. The pit is like a huge shed but filled with hundreds of Terra-Cotta warriors, each one being completely different from all the others. Each warrior represents members of the first Emperor of China's army. It is a form of funerary art buried with the emperor in 210-209 BCE, the purpose of which was to protect the emperor in his afterlife.

After lunch we visited the Huaqing Pool which is watered by hot springs and became famous as the bath place of a beautiful concubine of Xuanzong, who was one of the Emperors of the Tang dynasty.

China—continued

Day 7:

On this day, we enjoyed the beautiful gardens and Temple buildings at the Big Goose Pagoda. The original Pagoda was built during the reign of Emperor Gaozong of Tang (r. 649–683), and at the time it stood at a height of 54 m. The Pagoda has been heavily damaged throughout the years, resulting in the current height of seven stories.

We then visit the famous Muslim quarter in Xian, a food street. What makes this Muslim Street a food street is the unending lines of various restaurants and food stalls, some of which specialize in selling cakes, others in dried fruit or breads, and hordes of stalls selling barbecued meats on skewers. The students didn't really enjoy this.

Later we boarded our flight to Beijing.

Day 8:

Day 8 brought the start of the Chinese National Holiday. This meant we would encounter a lot of people in the next 5 days.

After breakfast we travelled to Tiananmen Square, where we had the opportunity to walk around the most famous People's square in the World. Tiananmen Square can hold over 1 million people, and it kind of felt like that. We went on to visit the Forbidden City, the palace of the Chinese Royal Family, which has 9,999 rooms! We found it hard to take the significance of the place in with so many people crowding around us.

In the afternoon, we visited the Temple of Heaven. The Temple of Heaven is a place where the emperors of the Ming and Qing dynasties would worship the god of heaven and pray for a good harvest. Covering an area of 273 hectares, it is the largest architectural complex in the world designed for rituals to pay homage to heaven. This experience was followed by a tea tasting. I'm sure many friends and families have been able to sample these teas, as most students brought some home.

Day 9:

On day 9, we travelled outside Beijing to visit the Ming Tombs. We walked down the beautiful Spirit Road, flanked by animal statues and magnificent willow trees, to the Ming Tombs.

After lunch, we drove through very heavy traffic to finally reach the Great Wall. As you arrive you are in

awe of just how high these mountains are. The Wall itself just seems to climb and climb, higher and higher. Each step/rock is a different size. It's not an easy climb what-so-ever. Four fit and determined students were able to make it to the top.

After dinner, we experienced the Olympic Village at night - all lit up in its glory. Once again we were treated like celebrities with the huge crowd.

Day 10

This day was welcomed with a much needed sleep-in. Our activities didn't start until after lunch. We started the day with a vertical stair climb up the Drum Tower. This was followed by a Hutong tour – roaming through Beijing's old narrow streets in an old-fashioned pedicab (rickshaw) to visit Siheyuan, the old quadrangles, and learn about the daily life of ordinary Beijing citizens.

Day 11

This morning we travelled to the Beijing Zoo where we had the chance to say "hello" to the Pandas. And that's basically all we saw.

We then travelled to the Summer Palace, which was originally built in 1750, and restored in 1888 after it was burnt down in 1860. The Palace is where the Royal family went to escape the hot summer of Beijing. Shuffling along the longest corridor in the world to the marble boat on the man-made lake was intense. The Summer Palace was by far the busiest place we visited. The afternoon was all about bargaining at the Silk Markets. The students and staff bought up big.

Day 12

This was our last day in China. After checking out of the hotel we visited the Lama Temple and Coal Hill Park. Afterwards, we visited the 798 Art District. Beginning in 2002, artists and cultural organizations began to divide, rent out, and re-make the factory spaces, gradually developing them into galleries, art centres, artists' studios, design companies and restaurants.

After 11 full, adventurous days we had to say goodbye to China and our wonderful guide Jane. Jane was amazing throughout our trip. The relationships she developed with the students will be long lasting.

We arrived in Sydney airport at 8:15pm. We were greeted with many familiar faces, a welcome party home.

Mathematics

ALL students require a calculator. A large number of students have become reliant on borrowing a calculator from staff. Could we please encourage everyone to purchase this calculator - Casio fx-82AU PLUS II before their exams in week 6. They are available from the front office for \$25.30

Stage 4 & 5 have exams in week 6. Each term this year, students have completed a pre and post test so we can monitor their improvement. These post tests will form a basis for their yearly exam. Teachers will be working through these as revision in class.

Mathematics students have been working hard to complete their work and to do their best in class. Both stage 4 (year 7 & 8) and stage 5 (year 9 & 10) had had their project due this semester. 100% of stage 4 students handed in their project with 97% of stage 5 students handing in their project. Congratulations to you all, well done!

Stage 4 completed a project on Pythagoras' theorem, measurement – perimeter/circumference/area and angles in triangles and quadrilaterals. This assessment was completed differently with students given a large number of tasks to complete of varying levels. Students were then able to select the tasks they could complete to hand in. All tasks did not need to be completed. Some students completed more tasks than were

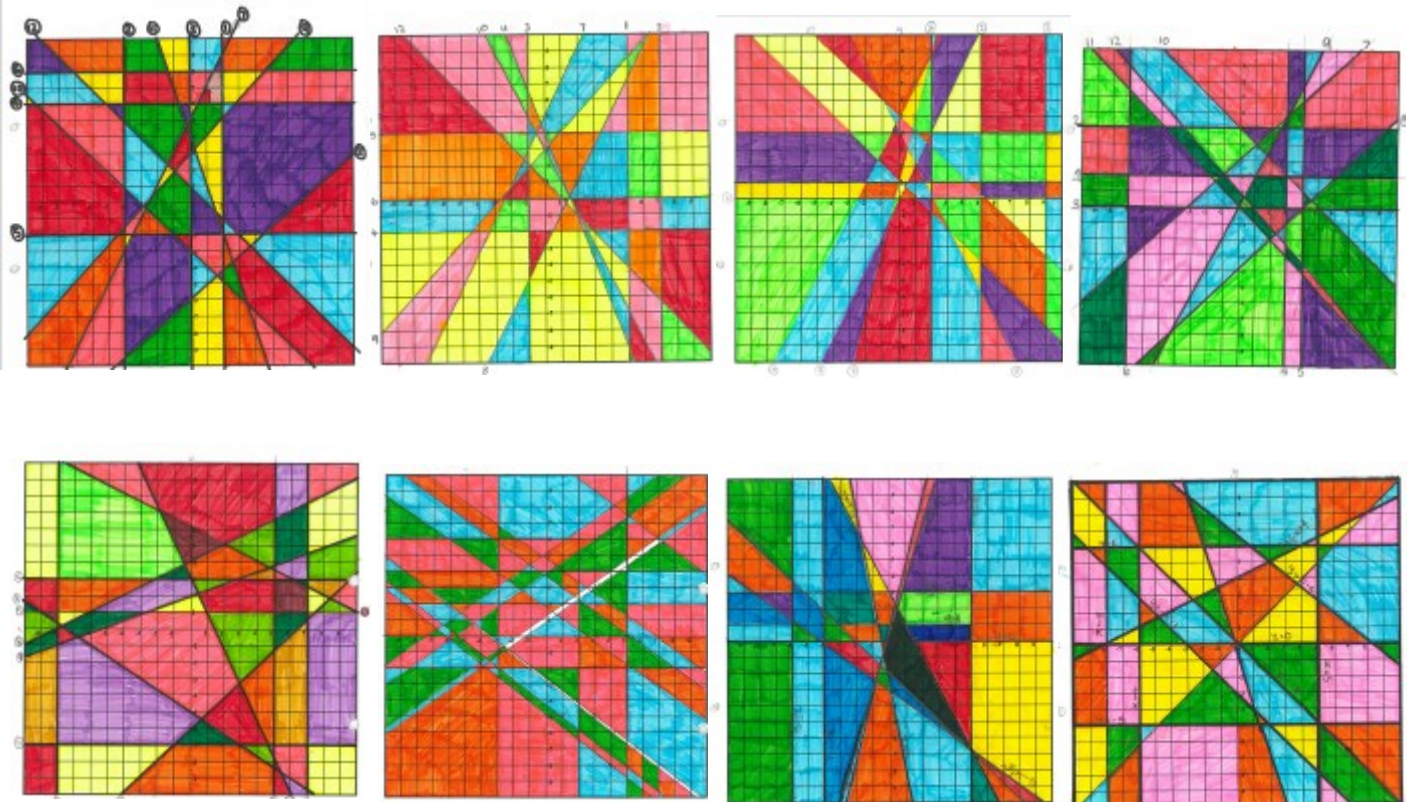
required and some students extended themselves to try the more difficult questions. Students needed to follow the marking guidelines to ensure they achieved the best mark. All students completed tasks and a large number achieved an excellent mark as they completed more than required. Well done stage 4!

Stage 5 completed a project on graphing lines to form a stained glass window. There were some outstanding stained glass windows produced as seen below. The 5.3 class were extended as their equations were written in more than one form to graph. They also used 4 number 4's with powers to form the numbers between -10 and 20. Some students also extended themselves to use 5 number 5's to also form numbers. All students were able to achieve this by investigating with the numbers and powers on a calculator. Some students learnt that you need to follow the marking criteria to maximise your mark. Congratulations Stage 5, well done!

Our stage 4 & 5 classes have been streamed to allow us to cater better to the individual student needs and develop their self-confidence for Mathematics. We will continue to do this in 2017. This has involved some students moving classes through the year as their needs change. If parents/guardians have any concerns, please contact Mrs Davis at the High school to discuss.

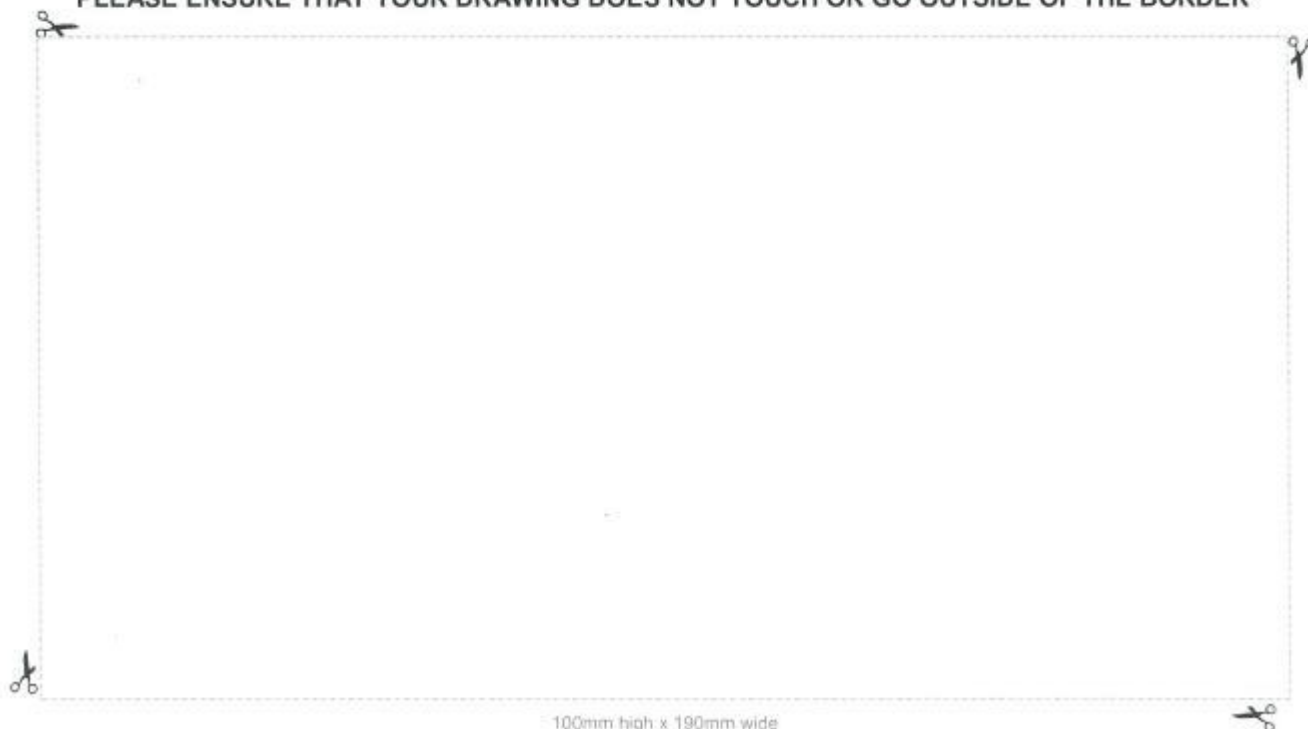

Assessments at Condobolin High School in 2016

There have been a number of changes in terms of assessments at Condobolin High School in 2016. Part of my role as assessment coordinator has been to rewrite the assessment policy and implement a number of changes across the school.

Students have all been issued with Assessment Booklets; these booklets are also available on the Condobolin High School Website, for each Year Group. These booklets are an important document for every child. They outline the assessment requirements for each subject across every year, outline the procedures to follow in terms of applying for an extension or misadventure and include a copy of the Board of Studies key terms.

Some important information for parents and students:

- Each assessment task requires a minimum of two weeks' notice to be given. Students are expected to sign a receipt of task at the time the task is issued. If a student is away from school it is their responsibility to seek out any missed assessments or classwork.
- No more than TWO assessment tasks should be due in each week for any year group. Please contact myself at school if this is not the case for your child.

- For any change of date of assessment your child should receive a notification in writing advising of the new date.
- All submitted assessments and quizzes are to be returned within two weeks. Again please feel free to contact myself if this is not occurring, and the assessment committee will be able to investigate the issue.
- If your child cannot attend school on the day of an assessment, or has been unable to complete an assessment due to reasons including – Sickness, Carers Responsibilities, Illness in the family, they must apply for either an Extension (If before the due date) or Misadventure. They need to collect these forms from Head Teachers and return with appropriate documentation to myself for processing.

We are hoping that by implementing new policies and procedures, that assessments at Condobolin High School, become more streamlined and meaningful for our students.
